TITHES.

AUTHORITY.

One tenth of the produce of the land of

NOTE.—All other tithes have been suspended or abolished, or replaced by Tithe Dues leviable on Exportation. (See page 8.)

TAX ON ANIMALS.

SHEEP AND GOAT TAX.

2½ silver piastres (3¼ c.p.) per head yearly on every sheep and 5 c.p. per head yearly on every goat one year old and upwards.

2 (c) of Law XI. of 1897.

The tax on goats may be increased and that on sheep decreased by the High Commissioner in Council provided that no increase shall be made in the total amount receivable as calculated upon the basis of the last preceding official returns of the numbers of sheep and goats in the Island.

Sheep and Goats not produced by the owners at the first official enumeration and uncounted thereat are liable to double tax.

PIG TAX.

4½ c.p. per head yearly on every pig over three months old.

Pigs not produced by the owners at the first official enumeration and uncounted thereat are liable to double tax.

VERGHI.

1. *Kimat*.

4 per 1,000 on the capital value of lands, houses and other immoveable property.

3. *Temettu*.

3 per cent. on trade profits and incomes (excluding salaries).

EXEMPTIONS.

Persons who under the Law of 29 Zilhidge, 1278, would have been entitled to exemption from tithe on olive trees planted by them may apply to the Verghi Department for exemption from vergi on such trees until such time as the immunity from tithe thereon would have expired if the tithe on olives were still leviable.

Artisans who do not keep shops and who receive daily hire for their labour\* (a), labourers receiving daily hire\* (a), and gardeners of Varoshia who were exempt under Turkish law (b), are exempted from payment of Verghi Temettu.

By letter from the Ministry of Finance of 16 Shewal, 1289, agriculturists, for the purpose of assessing the Temettu tax, are divided into three classes. The first comprises those who, having sufficient land, do not engage in commerce but are always occupied with agriculture even though they should take charcoal or other material to town twice or thrice a year for sale, or transport goods with their carts in order to provide for the necessities of their existence. These are exempt from Temettu. The second comprises those who, not having sufficient land for their subsistence, besides their own, work other peoples' land for hire or in partnership or do business with charcoal, firewood, &c. Temettu should be collected from these according to their assessed profits derived from sources other than the cultivation of their lands. (This category does not include those who hire other peoples' lands for the purpose of farming and who pay tithe on the produce raised upon such land: these are exempt from Temettu.) The third comprises those who may have sufficient land for their subsistence yet, being well off and doing business in other ways, leave their agricultural business to be carried on by their farm servants and employés. Temettu should be collected from these in proportion to their profits other than those derived from the cultivation of their lands.

Further, the Government has ruled that a man who carries on a lucrative business in addition to agriculture should be assessed for and pay Temettu on the profits derived from such business.

Gardeners are to be dealt with in the same manner as agriculturists.

\* By an Order dated the 30th March, 1887, it has been laid down that this exception shall not apply to masons who are builders and contractors as well as masons.

AUTHORITY.

## (MILITARY EXEMPTION TAX.)

Two shillings and four and a half copper piastres per head for all male inhabitants of the Island, not being foreigners, of not less than 18 years or more than 60 years of age.

Ordinance V. of 1878, as amended by Ordinance III. of 1880, and Order of High Commissioner of 22nd February 1879.

## EXEMPTIONS.

Priests of all religious denominations; all persons who are exempt from Military Service by Turkish law either by personal service or by payment made before the passing of Ordinance No. V. of 1878; all persons mentally or physically incapacitated from Military Service; and all persons in the Military or Civil employment of the Government of the Island.

## TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS.

- i.—All goods imported for the Government of Cyprus to be used in the public service and duly certified as so imported by the Chief Secretary to Government. Law No. XXII. of 1899.
- ii.—All Military Stores imported by Her Majesty's War Department and duly certified as such by the Officer to whom they are consigned.
- iii.—All goods imported for the use of the High Commissioner and duly certified by the High Commissioner to be so imported, and if any article or thing on which duty has been paid at the time of importation be subsequently supplied for the use of the High Commissioner, the amount of the duty on the article or thing so supplied shall be repaid out of the Treasury on the order of the High Commissioner..
- iv.—All articles of Military equipment imported by and for the use of any Officer of Her Majesty's land forces.
- v.—Goods and Stores of every description supplied under contract with Her Majesty's War Department for the public use of Her Majesty's land forces, duly certified as such by the principal Commissariat Officer, such certificate to be countersigned by the Chief Secretary to Government.
- vi.—Uniforms of Public Officers and professional robes of Legal or Judicial Officers in the employment of Her Majesty's Government, provided that such uniforms or robes are introduced for the personal use only of such officers, and have been duly authorized.
- vii.—Professional robes of Advocates entitled to practise in Cyprus.
- viii.—Authorized uniforms of Foreign Consuls and Consular Officers and national flags imported for their use.
- Authorized uniforms of any Foreign Government to be worn by persons entitled to wear them.
- Government medals and decorations to be worn by persons resident in Cyprus.
- ix.—Fire-arms for the personal use of Officers of Her Majesty's Naval and Military Forces.
- x.—Paving stones imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used for the paving of streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and Cashier of any Municipal Council.
- xi.—Street lamps and their fittings imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used in the lighting of Streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and the Cashier of any Municipal Council.
- xii.—Casks and vats, and staves and hoops for use in constructing casks and vats.
- xiii.—Microscopes and all microscopical and other apparatus or appliances for purposes of scientific investigation and research.
- xiv.—Gymnastic apparatus, mathematical and generally all other instruments used in schools for educational purposes, which are imported for the use of schools.
- xv.—Animals and livestock, atlases and maps, anchors and chains (ships'), bark, boats, charcoal, church furniture, and articles intended to be used in the building and fitting up of churches and mosques and vestments and other articles necessarily used for religious services and certified to be so intended or used, as the case may be, by the proper ecclesiastical authority, coals, empty casks and sacks, fresh fish, gold bullion and specie, ice, lime, medicines and medical appliances, pitch and tar, printed books, sawdust, silk-worms' eggs, sponges taken by licensed boats, stationery, printing paper, whether white or coloured, printing ink, printers' type, and printing materials, sulphur, wheat, barley, oats, vetches, flour, bran, chopped straw, cotton seed, fodder for cattle, and all mechanical appliances for use in manufacture and examination of wine; sulphur syringes, tombstones and memorial tablets, and tools and implements used in Agriculture and Handicrafts.
- xvi.—Machinery and parts of machinery and their fittings, connections and gearing.
- The High Commissioner may in certain cases order admission free of duty of goods sent for use in Consular Offices (Sec. 11 of Law XXII. of 1899).
- Dutiable articles that have previously been exported from Cyprus, provided they are re-imported not later than one year after exportation.
- Hospital appliances or equipment, certified under the hand of the Chief Medical Officer to be imported for the use of any Hospital.
- Fire-wood, free of Import duty.
- Postage Stamps—used or unused—other than those of Cyprus, are free of import duty.
- Empty cardboard boxes and labels, which the Chief Collector of Customs is satisfied are for use in connection with the raising of silk-worm eggs.

DRAWBACK OF IMPORT DUTY.

Persons who pay import duty on guns brought with them to Cyprus for sporting purposes are entitled to have three-fourths of the amount refunded at the Custom House, Larnaca, in the event of their taking the guns out of the Island within 5 years on production of the documents referred to in Sec. 2 (a) and (b) of Order in Council No. 19, *Gazette* 77 of 19th October, 1881.

When any Import Duty shall have been paid in respect of any wine, spirits, malt liquors, tobacco, cigars, or articles of food supplied for the use of any mess on board any of Her Majesty's ships of war, a drawback of the amount of the duty so paid may be allowed, or if such goods are shipped from the Customs store before payment of duty, the amount of such duty may be remitted on the production of a certificate from the proper officer of Customs that such goods have been actually shipped on board one of Her Majesty's ships, a receipt from the Paymaster of such ship for the goods and a written undertaking from the Paymaster or other proper officer of such ship that if such goods or any part thereof shall be at any time re-landed, the duty shall be paid thereon.

In lieu of drawback of import duty paid in respect of any wine, spirits, malt liquors, tobacco, cigars or articles of food imported and subsequently actually consumed or used by Her Majesty's Land Forces, fixed money allowances are paid out of the Island Treasury to the Officers and Soldiers of Her Majesty's Land Forces quartered within the Island.

The amount of duty paid on any article which may be subsequently supplied to the High Commissioner shall be refunded out of the Treasury on the order of the High Commissioner.

- (1). Silver or copper coins.
- (2). Beshliks, altiliks or metallique piastres.
- (3). All sovereigns and half sovereigns coined before the reign of Her late Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria.
- (4). All sovereigns and half sovereigns which are below the least current weight as defined in "The Coinage Act, 1870," or are otherwise not legally current in England.
- (5). The substance known as Hashish.
- (6). Salt other than table and rock salt.

The importation of the under-mentioned goods, articles and merchandise is subject to the following restrictions :

- (1). The importation into the Island of fire-arms, detached portions of fire-arms and side-arms is prohibited except—
  - (a.) at the ports of Larnaca and Limassol, and
  - (b.) without a special license under the hand of the Chief Secretary issued under the "Fire-arms (Importation) Law, 1891."
- (2). The importation of gunpowder (except for the use of His Majesty's Naval and Military forces) is prohibited except—
  - (a.) at the ports of Larnaca, and Limassol, and at the last named port the importation of gunpowder by any person in any greater quantity than ten okes or twenty-eight pounds is prohibited, and
  - (b.) in kegs or barrels of a capacity not exceeding ten okes or in flasks of 1lb. or of ½lb. except where the High Commissioner has by special permission authorised the importation in some other manner.
- (3). The importation of shot, percussion caps, cartridges (other than ball cartridges) and side-arms is restricted to the ports of Larnaca, and Limassol, and at the last named port the importation of cartridges by any person in greater quantity than ten okes or twenty-eight pounds is prohibited.
- (4). The importation of ball cartridges or of ball cartridge-cases except for the use of His Majesty's Naval and Military forces is prohibited, except—
  - (a.) at the ports of Larnaca and Limassol, and
  - (b.) with the special permission of the High Commissioner.
- (5). The importation of dynamite, nitroglycerine, gun-cotton, fulminate of mercury or of other metals or of any kindred substance is prohibited—
  - (a.) except at the port of Larnaca, and
  - (b.) with the special permission of the High Commissioner, such permission being in writing under the hand of the Chief Secretary to Government and subject to such conditions as the High Commissioner may think fit to impose.
- (6). The landing in Cyprus of cattle, horns, hoofs, bones, fodder, litter or dung from vessels arriving from places where cattle disease has been publicly notified to exist, is prohibited.
- (7). The importation of hides and skins is restricted to the port of Larnaca (except in cases where special permission under the hand of the Chief Medical Officer has been obtained to import them at some other place) and such importation shall, in all cases, be subject to the regulations in that behalf for the time being in force under the "Contagious Diseases (Animals)" Ordinance, 1880."
- (8). The importation of rags and old clothing into any port or place of the Island of Cyprus, other than Larnaca, is prohibited, and such importation is liable to be prohibited in any case in which the Chief Medical Officer or any Officer acting for or delegated by him certifies that the importation of rags or old clothing is likely to be injurious to the public health.

## PUBLIC DEBT.

---

Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power has undertaken to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid has been determined to be £87,686 per annum ; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113 11s. 3d. per annum has also become payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 is to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

A sum of £60,000 provided for by a loan has been expended on Irrigation, and £2,350 by way of interest and Sinking Fund is provided in the annual Estimates.

At Larnaca there is a Roman Catholic Convent of the Order of St. Joseph, and a Church and Convent in Nicosia belonging to the Order of St. Francis. According to the Census of 1901 there were 824 Members of the Roman Catholic Church throughout the Island.

Of the Maronite faith there are eight Churches and four Monasteries. According to the Census of 1901 there were 1,130 Members of the Maronite Church throughout the Island.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on Public Works and valuing their labour at 4½cp. per man per diem, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £913 6s. 2½cp. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, dyeing, carpentering, brush-making, stocking making and baking) is £1,069.

The amount derived from the sale of broken stone to Municipalities, etc., and paid into the Treasury was £2 17s.

1628 cubic yards of broken stone were supplied to the Public Works Department for which no payment was received.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held. The Greek Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. The attendances have been irregular of late.

Prisoners of good behaviour and industrious in labour, sentenced to not less than two years are, if males, after three-fourths, or, if females, after two-thirds of their term of imprisonment has expired, recommended to the High Commissioner for remission of their sentence, with, or without, Ticket of Leave.

The District Medical Officer certifies as to the cause of death. A Coroner's Inquest was held in the Nicosia General Hospital on a lunatic prisoner who died suddenly in his cell in Central Prison on 4th December, 1903. The verdict was that death was due to "Fatty Degeneration of the Heart."
