(i.) in the case of Refined Sugar, Molasses and Extracts from Sugar, and Manufactured Tobacco, at least 5 per cent. of the total value of the goods is the result of labour within the British Empire;

(ii.) in the case of optical glass and optical elements, whether finished or not, microscopes, field and opera glasses, theodolites, sextants, spectroscopes and other optical instruments, and of component parts of the above, at least 75 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire;

(iii.) in the case of the goods enumerated in the Schedule to the Customs, Excise and Revenue (Amendment) Regulations, 1933, at least 50 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire; and

(iv.) in the case of all other goods at least 25 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire.

The total value of an article being its cost to the manufacturer at the factory or works including the value of containers and other forms of interior packing.

The proportion of value which is the result of labour within the British Empire includes the cost to the manufacturer of any materials of purely Empire origin entering into the composition of the article (including interior packing) the cost of manufacture including wages, proportion of fuel, supervision and other factory expenses, and the cost of the labour of packing for retail sale.

(1) *Bona fide* baggage consists of (a) wearing apparel and other personal effects; and (b) household effects (such as furniture, carpets, pictures, glassware, linen, cutlery, crockery and plate) which are proved to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs to have been in personal or household use by the passenger and are not for sale. No person is, however, entitled to exemption on household effects other than upon first arrival in Cyprus to enter upon an office or employment or as a settler.

Bona fide baggage does not include arms, ammunition, cigars and cigarettes exceeding 100, tobacco exceeding half a pound, wines and spirits exceeding one pint, perfumed spirits exceeding one pint, merchandise, carriages, motor vehicles, bicycles, musical instruments, saddlery, provisions, and piece goods.

(a) The importation of the following articles is not prohibited:—Wheat, barley and other cereals, and all dry seeds (except cotton seed) properly cleaned from the husk, straw and earth; acorns; vallonias; almonds, walnuts, chestnuts, and other nuts, (including ground nuts), free from the outer husks, leaves, stalks and branches; preserves; crystallized fruits; bottled and canned fruits and vegetables hermetically sealed in proper receptacles; flour and meal of all kinds and every preparation thereof; tamarind; saponaria wood; vegetables desiccated by artificial heat and enclosed in packages; dry and aromatic plants used for medicinal purposes and for dyeing, if free of earth; dried fruit and vegetables, provided the proper officer of Customs is satisfied that they are *bona fide* dried fruit and vegetables, and subject to inspection by any officer of the Agricultural Department and to any treatment at the expense and risk of the importer which may be required by such officer; carobs, if free from earth (Order in Council No. 1421 of 23rd April, 1931, published in *Gazette* No. 2131 of 1st May, 1931).

Potatoes for seed purposes only may be imported at Famagusta, Larnaca, Limassol or Paphos in such quantities and from such countries only as shall be specially authorized beforehand in writing by the Director of Agriculture. The potatoes must be imported direct from the country of origin, provided that they may be transhipped if they remain in Customs charge while at the transshipping port. Every consignment of potatoes for seed purposes must be accompanied by the documents set out in Order in Council No. 1305 of 20th May, 1929, published in *Gazette* No. 1985 of 23rd May, 1929, and is subject to inspection by the Director of Agriculture or an inspecting officer acting on his behalf.

The importation from the American Continent (including Canada, the United States of America, South America and West Indies), China, Cochin-China, Greece, India, Russia, Turkestan, Turkey, and from any country not possessing a Government Entomological service, either directly or indirectly, of cotton seed and seed cotton, and any green or living part of the Cotton Plant; of dry leaves, sticks, or refuse of the Cotton Plant; of raw cotton; and of packing material which has or is suspected of having been used in the transportation or storage of any part of the Cotton Plant, is permitted through the Port of Famagusta if the importation is accompanied by a statutory declaration in the prescribed form and if forthwith on importation these articles are disinfected in such manner as the Director of Agriculture shall prescribe, or placed in quarantine in such place and for such period as he shall deem fit. If the aforesaid articles have been imported from a country other than those herein mentioned, importation is permitted through the Port of Famagusta provided that such importation is accompanied by a statutory declaration by the shipper in the prescribed form naming the place of origin (Order in Council No. 1054 of 13th May, 1925, published in *Gazette* No. 1695 of 15th May, 1925).

up to a maximum of six pounds, no charge being made at a third or subsequent port if called at within the said period of four weeks.

3. Ships arriving at any port in Cyprus from a foreign port or from another port in Cyprus and leaving such port in Cyprus without having taken cargo and without having landed or taken on board passengers, and having on board empty barrels or empty cases only and discharging such empty barrels or empty cases and no other cargo :

For every ton of registered tonnage	1cp.
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but not exceeding the maximum amount of Six Pounds.

4. Dues payable in respect of any ship, other than a steamer, may be compounded for by the payment in advance of one shilling for each ton of the ship's registered tonnage for every half-year. A half year shall be deemed to be any period between the 1st January and the 30th June or between the 1st July and the 31st December in any year.

5. Full dues are payable in respect of any ship hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government for the conveyance of troops or stores but which is also employed without the consent of the proper authority of the Admiralty for the importation of goods other than goods or stores for His Majesty's service.

6. For the conveyance of goods with the consent of the proper authority of the Admiralty by any transport or ship hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government, the person importing such goods shall pay in lieu of dues a sum equal to one shilling per ton on the amount of such goods with a minimum amount of five shillings.

Ships of war.

Transports in His Majesty's service.

Ships hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government for the conveyance of troops or stores for His Majesty's service, and flying the Admiralty transport flag.

Yachts belonging to recognised yacht clubs and wholly in ballast.

Ships which having entered a port under stress of weather or for obtaining provisions or water shall leave it without having effected any commercial transaction other than the landing of passengers under stress of weather.

Steam tugs employed solely in towing and not having goods or passengers on board.

Ships which have entered a port for the purpose of loading or discharging cargo and which are prevented, through stress of weather or quarantine restrictions, from loading or discharging any cargo.

Ships which enter a port wholly in ballast and leave without having loaded cargo and without having landed or taken on board passengers or cargo or having effected any commercial transaction.

Ships calling at a port in Cyprus for orders or medical inspection only and without having effected any commercial transaction proceeding to another port in Cyprus. Provided that the towing of lighters and the conveyance of hamals from the one port to the other port shall not be deemed to be a commercial transaction.

Ice and snow are accepted for conveyance at owner's risk only at half luggage rates, subject to a minimum of $4\frac{1}{2}$ cp.

Plants, cut flowers and shrubs are accepted for conveyance at owner's risk only at double luggage rates, subject to a minimum of $4\frac{1}{2}$ cp.

Perishables not taken delivery of at destination within 24 hours are sold at owner's risk and expense.

Returned empties.—Returned empty baskets, barrels, crates, drums and tins, etc., are charged as follows:—

Loading and unloading.—Goods loaded or unloaded by the Railway are charged as follows :—

(i) At Nicosia Station and Famagusta :—

- At goods shed or private sheds or sidings in station limits 4½*cp.* per ton.
- Consignments of 6 tons and over 3*cp.* per ton.
- Goods whose size, weight or bulk demands a special arrangement and handling 1*s.* per ton.

(ii) At all other stations 1*s.* per ton.

Minimum charge for both loading and unloading, 3*cp.*

Special rates may be made for any large or regular quantities or according to special circumstances on application to the General Manager.

Loading and unloading at Nicosia is done by the Railway unless consignors or consignees express a wish to the contrary.

Collection and delivery and road transport services.—The charges for these services are at such rates as the General Manager with the approval of the Governor may from time to time determine. Particulars of such rates can be obtained at any Railway office.

Clearing of bonded goods.—The Railway undertakes the following services in connection with the clearance of bonded goods :—

- (a) Delivery of bill of lading to steamer agent.
- (b) Collection of delivery order.
- (c) Payment of landing charges, wharfage, portorage and loading.

Goods so dealt with are sent in bond to the Customs Bonded Warehouse, Nicosia, where consignees can pay duty and receive their goods.

Lost property.—All property found at stations or in carriages is retained at the station at which it is found for a period of 14 days; after that time it is sent to the Lost Property Office, Famagusta, where it is kept for three months. On the expiration of this period it is sold.

Special rates and charges.—The General Manager may make such special rates and charges as he may think fit in the interests of the Railway.

Rebate.—A rebate of 10% on rail freight is granted for any consignments not already carried at special rates of two tons and over booked through from Famagusta Harbour or Famagusta town for carriage by Rail and Road to any place served by Railway Road Services a distance of 10 miles and over from Nicosia.

NOTE.—Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power undertook to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid was determined to be £37,686 per annum; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113 11s. 3d. per annum also became payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 was to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS.

Duties and Powers :—

The regulation of the cleanliness, sanitation and conservancy of the town or village comprised within the municipal limits, and all matters relating to the same ; the control of the erection, alteration and repair of buildings, and the demolition of buildings unfit or dangerous for habitation ; the supervision and control of bakeries, and the inspection of food-stuffs and liquids intended for human consumption ; the regulation of the weighing, measuring and testing of goods ; the grant of profession and trade licences, dog licences, theatre and cinematograph licences, building permits, etc.; the provision of storage accommodation for explosive substances and petroleum ; the establishment of poor-houses ; the provision of slaughter-houses, and the regulation of the slaughter of animals for food ; the construction, improvement, upkeep and lighting of streets ; the regulation of the traffic in the streets ; the provision of a good and sufficient supply of water ; the contribution towards the cost of maintaining public hospitals, and the provision and maintenance of infant welfare centres within municipal limits ; the construction of works of public utility ; the contribution towards or the undertaking of the cost of charitable and educational schemes or institutions ; the acquisition of lands or buildings for any purpose of public utility ; the establishment and regulation of municipal markets and parks or other places of recreation ; and, with the approval of the Governor, the making of bye-laws for the regulation of the various matters coming within the scope of their functions, and the imposition of fees or charges in connection therewith.

Sources of revenue :—

Rates (at present not levied) on immovable property within municipal limits ; fees for theatre and cinematograph licences, dog licences and building permits ; water rates ; slaughter-house fees ; weighing and measuring fees ; hawking fees ; fees and tolls of municipal markets ; tolls on certain foreign goods ; rents from municipal markets and buildings ; fees for the storage of inflammable substances ; and fines recovered under the Municipal Corporations Laws and bye-laws.

THE CYPRUS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Objects and duties :—

To watch over and protect the general interests of commerce and industry in Cyprus, and to collect information from foreign manufacturers and traders which may assist the development of commerce and industry ; to establish means whereby the transaction of commercial business may be facilitated ; to encourage and promote new commercial, agricultural and industrial enterprise in Cyprus ; to intervene, as an advisory body, with the local Government in all matters affecting the general interests of Cyprus in commerce and industry ; when requested, to undertake by arbitration and conciliation the settlement of commercial disputes ; to place local merchants in touch with British and foreign manufacturers and merchants and *vice versa* ; to correspond with foreign Chambers of Commerce and similar bodies and private firms for the purpose of obtaining and giving information on the standing and reliability of merchants ; when requested, to deal with all claims, applications, suggestions, petitions, etc., addressed to the Government on subjects of a commercial or industrial nature, whether of general or personal interest ; and to issue certificates of origin for articles produced or manufactured in Cyprus, certificates of membership of the Chamber, certificates of commercial standing, and any other certificates required by traders.

Sources of revenue :—

Subscriptions of members, annual subsidies granted by Municipal Corporations, and fees for the issue of various certificates and in respect of applications for commercial information.

It is laid down in Clause II of the Instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, dated the 10th March, 1925, that the Executive Council of the Colony shall, save as thereafter provided, consist of such persons not exceeding four, holding public offices within the Colony as the Governor may, by an Instrument or Instruments made in His Majesty's name and under the Public Seal of the Colony, constitute and appoint to be Members thereof. Whenever any such Member shall die, or resign his seat in the said Council, or be absent from the Colony, or be lawfully suspended from his office, or become from any cause incapable of discharging the duties thereof, the Governor may by any such Instrument as aforesaid nominate any other person whom he shall think fit, being within the Colony, to fill any such vacancy.

In addition to the Members appointed under the above-mentioned clause the Governor may, by an Instrument made in His Majesty's name and under the Public Seal of the Colony, appoint any fit persons residing in the Colony, not exceeding three in number at any one time, to be Members of the said Executive Council, and summon such Additional Members to the meetings of the said Executive Council on any occasion on which he shall think it desirable to obtain their advice.

Provided that meetings of the said Executive Council shall be held to be duly constituted notwithstanding that the said Additional Members may not have been summoned thereto.

An Additional Member of the Executive Council shall vacate his seat as such Additional Member at the end of three years from the date of the Instrument by which he is appointed.

7.—SUMMARY OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

7.—A summarized statement of any developments in the agricultural, forestal, fishing, mining, and other industries of the Colony during the year under review, with a statement as to progress up to date. A special account should be given of Government grants or other action for the development of the natural resources and industries of the Colony.

Cyprus is essentially an agricultural country, and the agricultural population is extremely conservative. Nevertheless owing to the lower prices offered for exportable produce and the loss or partial loss of some nearby markets for certain products on account of tariff or other restrictive measures, the necessity of searching for alternative crops and markets has been brought home to producers and exporters. Furthermore farmers have shown an increased desire to improve their methods.

During 1934, as was the case in the previous year, the main agricultural developments were connected rather with marketing than production, and were rendered possible only by an improvement in the quality of produce offered. In order to protect the local wheat production protective duties were imposed on imported foreign flour.

A considerable improvement in the grading and packing of citrus fruit for export resulted in increased sales in the United Kingdom and Northern Europe. This improvement was assisted and fostered by the newly-organized fruit inspection service, by regulations governing the exportation of citrus fruit and pomegranates, and by intensive propaganda, advice and instruction.

There has been an expansion of the exportation of wines to the United Kingdom, which is the result of increased demand due to improvement in quality. This improvement is due in large measure to propaganda carried out by the Government and to instruction and assistance afforded by it to producers.

A steady demand exists in neighbouring countries for cattle, mules and donkeys from Cyprus. Unfortunately unfavourable seasons have somewhat reduced the supplies of animals available to meet this demand, but the services maintained by Government at Stud Stables throughout the Island and the provision of premium donkeys and other stud animals on loan have maintained and improved the quality of the stock.

The flax spinning and weaving establishment at Zodia and the flax scutching mills at Zodia and Yeroskipos were conducted during the year by private enterprise with the advice and assistance of flax officers of the Agricultural Department.

The provision of Tobacco Instructors by Government to assist the growers and instruct them in the proper methods of growing and preparing tobacco was continued. Much of this tobacco is consumed locally, but there is also an increased interest in the use of Cyprus yellow-leaf tobacco for the manufacture of Cyprus cigarettes in the cigarette factories established in England.

The silk industry was carried on under the close supervision of Inspectors, who are responsible by law for encouraging and assisting production and giving advice. Prices are at present not such as to encourage increased interest in this industry, and owing to the unremunerative price of silk the Silk Filature at Yeroskipos was closed down.

The threshing machinery and tractors purchased from funds granted by the Empire Marketing Board have aroused considerable interest. The demand for the use of the threshing machinery is not yet up to the full working capacity but the demand by the more enterprising and enlightened farmers is steadily increasing.

Apart from these special forms of assistance to particular industries, the Agricultural Department of the Colony continues to give advice, to encourage the cultivation of all suitable crops, to assist agriculturists, to control animal and plant diseases, and, generally, to foster agriculture, the main industry of the Colony, in all its branches, by means of its various organized technical services and by instruction given by itinerant agricultural officers.

The investigations to locate sub-soil water with the aid of the drilling plants were continued during the year. The amount of additional water made available from these activities was 1,495,584 gallons per day. Twenty-five wells were drilled, aggregating 4,920 feet of borehole, and of this number 12 wells were successfully carried to a second source producing the amount of water mentioned above.

Owing to lack of funds re-afforestation by artificial methods had to be reduced to small scale experiments and to repair-planting in existing plantations. Some 9,016 seedlings were sold to private individuals during the year.

Continued low prices and a restricted demand in the European markets have adversely affected the sales of copper and sulphur. The Cyprus Mines Corporation has completed the construction of the new metallurgical plant and is now in a position to ship high-grade concentrates. The Corporation has also actively worked the gold-bearing lode at Skouriotissa with encouraging results, and the Cyprus and General Asbestos Company, Ltd., in spite of keen competition, has increased its sales of low-grade fibre. The amount of labour employed on both mines is well maintained.

There has been an increase in the number of prospecting permits issued, but on outstanding discoveries are to be recorded.

Among minor industries, carpet-making and broom-making showed continued activity.

Shoe-making and furniture-making are progressing. Owing to change in policy, the Forest Department gave up letting contracts for the manufacture and sale of wooden articles, but one carpenter is continuing and others in various parts of the Island are taking up this kind of working in wood. The manufacture of wooden articles by the local carpenters is increasing, following the original work started by the Forest Department.

The art of embroidery is also well advanced; a great number of girls and women are engaged on needlework and lace-making. Lace is in wide demand abroad.

The making of stockings by machinery mainly for local use has spread considerably and the industry of hat-making, for ladies, is gaining ground.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on public works and valuing their labour at 4½cp. per man per diem for stone-breaking and 6cp. for other work, and estimating the value of prisoners' labour on constructional work for the Public Works Department at 1s. per diem, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £1,919. 12s. 1cp. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, carpentering, stocking-making, farming and baking) is £2,594. 2s. 0cp. The estimated value of the labour of those employed in the domestic service of the Central Prison is £990. 6s. 2cp.

Eleven cubic yards of broken stone were supplied to the Public Works Department for which no payment was received, and 36 cubic yards to the Municipality of Paphos for which £1. 4s. 0cp. was received.

Prison labour was supplied to the Municipality of Paphos during the year for which the sum of £8. 4s. 0cp. was received.

In winter 10 hours, in summer 8 hours. Sleep is in association in the District Prisons. The passages, corridors, and wards are well lighted. They are constantly patrolled during the night, and are visited frequently and at uncertain hours by the Governor of the Prison.

Each prisoner sleeps in a separate cell in the Central Prison.

One warder is stationed in each corridor or (in the Central Prison) block.

There are no Chaplains attached to the prisons. Priests of all denominations are admitted at the request of the prisoners.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held, except at Paphos for Greek-Christians. The Greek-Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. In the Central Prison a service for Moslems is held on Fridays and on Sundays a priest or layman attends and ministers to the members of the Greek Church. The attendance of the hodja and that of the priest and layman has been regular. A religious and general instructor (in addition to the priest or layman) appointed from 6th May, 1906, for Greek ; also for Moslem. Attendance of Moslem and Greek teachers to school classes and for religious instruction has been regular.

Access is allowed to priests of all denominations. They are not apprised when prisoners are admitted, but notice would be given if prisoners expressed a wish to see them.

In Central Prison 3 classes of one hour each are held weekly ; in District Prisons there are no schools ; but well-conducted prisoners who can read are allowed to have educational and religious books of their respective persuasions.

Answers.

Prisoners of good behaviour and industrious in labour sentenced to not less than two years are, if males, after three-fourths, or, if females, after two-thirds of their term of imprisonment has expired, recommended to the Governor for remission of their sentence, with, or without, Ticket of Leave. Prisoners under a sentence of less than two years but not less than one month earn by good conduct and industry a remission of one-sixth of their sentence.

Seven prisoners died in prison during the past year as a result of execution. No inquest was held, but the Medical Officer certified in each case that death was due to dislocation of the cervical vertebrae.

One prisoner died in the Prison Hospital. An inquest was held by the Coroner and the verdict was "Natural death".

NICOSIA:

General Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is limited, but sufficient. The source is a well dug in the Hospital ground. Quality is good. An additional supply has been laid on by a service pipe from the Public Works Department pumping station.
- II. There are four full length enamelled iron baths, two for male wards, one for female wards and one for Maternity wards. There are four water closets, two for male patients and two for female patients. There is also one closet for male patients with one pail.
- III. Night soil pails are cleaned several times daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently white-washed. In addition there are two bed pan sluices, one in male ward and one in female ward.

Sanatorium.

- I. There is a plentiful supply of good water obtained from wells.
- II. There are no baths, but a wash room is attached to each Block of Buildings in which small zinc baths are used.
- III. Night soil pails are cleaned daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently white-washed.

Leper Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is limited. The water supply is from a chain of wells which also supplies the Mental Hospital. Quality is good.
- II. There are two zinc baths and two closets, one for male and one for female patients.
- III. Night soil pails cleaned daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently white-washed.

LARNACA:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is practically unlimited. The source is the town aqueduct. Quality is good.
- II. There is a bathroom for each male and female department, with one full length bath in each.
- III. Drainage of water through cemented conduits into cesspits; earth closet, two for male and two for female patients, cleaned daily; disinfectants used freely; the closets are separate from the main building and are reached by a roofed passage.

LIMASSOL:

District Hospital.

- I. The water supply is limited but has been improved by an additional pipe line. It is derived from the town water-works. Quality is good, but hard.
- II. There are two full length enamelled baths, one for male wards and one for female.
- III. There is no sewerage system; waste water is conducted by channels into deep cesspits. Two closets are provided for male patients and two for females, there is also a closet for private wards. The dry earth system is in use, the latrines are fly-proof, are cleaned & disinfected daily & frequently white-washed.

FAMAGUSTA:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is sufficient. Source, a fountain $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant, from which the water is conveyed by an aqueduct. There is also a well in the hospital ground. Quality is good.
- II. There is one water closet and a bathroom for each male and female department, with one full length bath in each.
- III. Dry earth latrines are used and the contents trenched in the fields daily. There is no sewerage.

PAPHOS:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is practically unlimited and is derived from the town supply. The quality is very good.
- II. There is one bathroom and one full-sized bath.
- III. There is no sewerage. Earth closet system, cleaned daily.

KYRENIA:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is sufficient; it is derived from the town aqueduct and a well in the hospital garden. Quality is good.
- II. There are two lavatories and two bathrooms with zinc baths and water laid on.
- III. Drainage of water through cemented conduits into a cesspit. There are two earth closets cleaned twice a day.

REMARKS ON THE WEATHER EXPERIENCED DURING THE YEAR 1933.

The Mean Temperature as recorded in the screen at Nicosia during 1934 was $66^{\circ}.8F.$, as against $66^{\circ}.6F.$ for the last 15 years. The Mean Maximum was $78^{\circ}.5F.$, and the Mean Minimum $55^{\circ}.2F.$, as against $78^{\circ}.5F.$ and $54^{\circ}.6F.$ respectively for the last 15 years.

The average Rainfall for the whole Island for 1934 was 23.68 inches.

The rainy and cool season is from October to March. The climate is varied; hot and dry in the plains in summer, damp on the sea-shore and cool on the hills.

The Mean Pressure given in the Return is reduced to $32^{\circ}F.$, Mean Gravity and Mean Sea Level.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE

The Postmaster-General shall not be liable to make good any claim arising out of the loss, damage or delay of parcels sent by post.

A system of compensation for loss of or damage to uninsured parcels is in force between Cyprus, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Egypt and France. The maximum amount of compensation payable is £1.

CUSTOMS DECLARATION.

The sender of each parcel for abroad will be required to fill up a Customs Declaration Form. Upon this form must be given an accurate statement of the contents and value, date of posting, and the sender's signature and address.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS.

Parcels on arrival in Cyprus will be liable to examination by an Officer of Customs, who will assess the amount of Customs dues to be charged thereon. The Customs dues will be collected at the time of delivery, and no parcel can be delivered until the Customs and all other charges are paid.

Parcels found to contain forbidden articles and parcels, the contents and value of which have been falsely declared, may be dealt with according to the laws on the subject. And generally the senders of parcels, whether in Foreign Countries or Cyprus, will be required to conform to the Customs and other laws or regulations from time to time in force in respect of such parcels.

Parcels which cannot be delivered, returned to the senders, or re-directed, and which have thus become undeliverable, will eventually be returned to the country of origin.

Parcels becoming offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other parcels will be disposed of as the Postmaster-General may direct.

DUTY COLLECTION FEE.

A fee of 2cp. is charged by the Post Office in respect of each parcel delivered in Cyprus upon which Customs duty has to be collected.

UNDELIVERABLE PARCELS.

Parcels to Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Egypt and the Sudan, and those British Possessions and Foreign Countries which have adopted the arrangement, which bear one address only, if not claimed by the addressee within a prescribed period which varies from 15 to 90 days according to the country of destination, will be treated as undeliverable, and will be either returned to the sender or disposed of in accordance with the sender's wishes should such be inscribed on the parcels. If the parcels bear two addresses, they will be held at the disposal of the first addressee for a specified period (usually about half of the total period of retention) and if not claimed will be held at the disposal of the second addressee for the remainder of the total period of retention, and if then unclaimed will be treated as undeliverable.

Parcels received from those British Possessions and Foreign Countries which have adopted the above mentioned arrangement will be retained for 15 days, that is to say, 8 days at the disposal of the first addressee and 7 days at the disposal of the second addressee.

Parcels to and from countries which have not agreed to apply the simplified arrangement for the treatment of undeliverable parcels will be retained at the Post Office to which they are addressed for a period not exceeding three months; but if possible the senders will be consulted, through the office of origin, as to disposal.

FREE DELIVERY.

For the delivery of parcels in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and Egypt free of any charges.

COLLECTION OF TRADE CHARGES.

REMOUBSEMENT SYSTEM.

The "Remboursement" system is designed to meet the requirements of persons who wish to pay for articles sent to them at the time of receipt of the articles and also to meet the requirements of traders and others who wish to recover through the agency of the Post Office the value of articles supplied by them.

Throughout these Regulations the amount to be collected under the "Remboursement" system is called the "Trade Charge."

The amount of Trade Charge shall not exceed the limits accepted by the country of destination and the maximum shall in no case exceed £40 including the fees payable at the office of origin and postage.

Every "Remboursement Parcel" posted or delivered in Cyprus shall be chargeable with such special fees as may be prescribed for that purpose.

The fees payable at the office of origin will be collected at the time of posting; and should be included by the sender in the amount required to be collected from the addressee. The full amount so collected is remitted to the sender of the parcel by means of Trade Charge Money Orders.

Remboursement parcels may be posted at the Post Offices at Famagusta, Kyrenia, Larnaca, Lefka, Lefkara, Lefkoniko, Limassol, Morphou, Nicosia, Paphos, Polis and Yialousa, and at Pedhoulas, Platres and Troödos during the summer season.

The sender of a parcel posted under the Remboursement system may not have the amount of the Trade Charge cancelled or reduced after posting.

If a Remboursement parcel which bears one address only is not claimed by the addressee within a period of 15 days, the parcel will be treated as undeliverable. If a Remboursement parcel bearing two addresses is not claimed by the first addressee within a period of 8 days, the parcel will be held at the disposal of the second addressee for a further period of 7 days and if then unclaimed will be treated as undeliverable.

FEES PAYABLE.

For each Remboursement parcel posted in Cyprus, in addition to the usual postage and insurance or other fees, a fee of 2cp.

For each £1 or fraction of £1 on the value of the Trade Charge of each parcel posted in Cyprus, a Remboursement fee of 2cp.

For each Remboursement parcel delivered in Cyprus a Delivery fee of 4½cp.
