(1) This tariff applies to goods consigned from and grown, produced or manufactured in the British Empire.

"British Empire" means the United Kingdom, the Dominions, India, Burma, the territories administered by His Majesty's Governments in the Dominions under Mandate or otherwise, the British Colonies, the British Protectorates and protected States, and the Mandated Territories of Tanganyika, the Cameroons under British Mandate and Togoland under British Mandate.

Goods are not deemed to have been manufactured in the British Empire unless

(i.) in the case of Manufactured Tobacco, at least 5 per cent. of the total value of the goods is the result of labour within the British Empire ;

(ii.) in the case of optical glass and optical elements, whether finished or not, microscopes, field and opera glasses, theodolites, sextants, spectroscopes and other optical instruments, and of component parts of the above, at least 75 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire ;

(iii.) in the case of the goods enumerated in the Schedule to the Customs, Excise and Revenue (Amendment) Regulations, 1933, at least 50 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire ; and

(iv.) in the case of all other goods at least 25 per cent. of their total value is the result of labour within the British Empire.

the total value of an article being its cost to the manufacturer at the factory or works including the value of containers and other forms of interior packing.

The proportion of value which is the result of labour within the British Empire includes the cost to the manufacturer of any materials of purely Empire origin entering into the composition of the article (including interior packing) the cost of manufacture including wages, proportion of fuel, supervision and other factory expenses, and the cost of the labour of packing for retail sale.

(1) The import duty for any shot-gun imported by and for the use of a visitor shall be five shillings for each month or part of a month during which such shot-gun shall remain in Cyprus :

Provided that—

- (a) The visitor importing the shot-gun—
- (i) shall, upon the importation of such shot-gun, pay to the proper officer of Customs the sum of one pound, and
 - (ii) shall, at the time of the importation of such shot-gun, make and sign a declaration in the prescribed form, and
 - (iii) shall have complied with the provisions of the Firearms Laws, 1933 to 1937, relating to the importation of firearms; and
- (b) the shot-gun is exported from Cyprus or placed in Customs bond not later than four months from the date of the importation thereof.

Upon the exportation from Cyprus or the placing in Customs bond of the shot-gun, before the expiration of the period of four months from the date of the importation thereof as provided in (b) above, a refund shall be made to the visitor at the rate of five shillings for every complete unexpired month within the said period of four months.

Any visitor who fails to export or place any such shot-gun in Customs bond within the period of four months as provided in (b) above shall pay forthwith the full amount of the import duty prescribed for such shot-gun less the one pound paid upon the importation into Cyprus of the shot-gun.

4. Dues payable in respect of any ship, other than a steamer, may be compounded for by the payment in advance of one shilling for each ton of the ship's registered tonnage for every half year. A half year shall be deemed to be any period between the 1st January and the 30th June or between the 1st July and the 31st December in any year.

5. Full dues are payable in respect of any ship hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government for the conveyance of troops or stores but which is also employed without the consent of the proper authority of the Admiralty for the importation of goods other than goods or stores for His Majesty's service.

6. For the conveyance of goods with the consent of the proper authority of the Admiralty by any transport or ship hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government, the person importing such goods shall pay in lieu of dues a sum equal to one shilling per ton on the amount of such goods with a minimum amount of five shillings.

Ships of war.

Transports in His Majesty's service.

Ships hired or chartered by His Majesty's Government for the conveyance of troops or stores for His Majesty's service, and flying the Admiralty transport flag.

Yachts belonging to recognized yacht clubs and wholly in ballast.

Ships which having entered a port under stress of weather or for obtaining provisions or water shall leave it without having effected any commercial transaction other than the landing of passengers under stress of weather.

Steam tugs employed solely in towing and not having goods or passengers on board.

Ships which have entered a port for the purpose of loading or discharging cargo and which are prevented, through stress of weather or quarantine restrictions, from loading or discharging any cargo.

Ships which enter a port wholly in ballast and leave without having loaded cargo and without having landed or taken on board passengers or cargo or having effected any commercial transaction.

Ships calling at a port in Cyprus for orders or medical inspection only and without having effected any commercial transaction proceeding to another port in Cyprus. Provided that the towing of lighters and the conveyance of hammals from the one port to the other port shall not be deemed to be a commercial transaction.

Ships under 10 tons registered tonnage owned by persons domiciled in Cyprus.

Ships of the Khedivial Mail Steamship and Graving Dock Company Limited calling at the ports both of Larnaca and Famagusta on the Cyprus-Palestine service are exempt from the payment of any dues under the Shipping Dues Laws, 1917 and 1932, in respect of their call at the port of Famagusta.

Plants, cut flowers and shrubs are accepted for conveyance at owner's risk only at double luggage rates, subject to a minimum of 4½p.

Perishables not taken delivery of at destination within 24 hours are sold at owner's risk and expense.

Returned empties.—Returned empty baskets, barrels, crates, drums and tins, etc., are charged as follows:—

(a) When conveyed in the luggage van Half ordinary luggage rates.

(b) When conveyed as goods 15 paras per ton per mile.

Minimum charge, 1½p.

Long, bulky, heavy or "out of gauge" goods.—When such goods occupy and require the use of an entire truck, but are not capable of being loaded to the extent of the carrying capacity of that truck, a minimum weight may be charged or weight may be computed on a measurement basis as the Railway Administration may decide. In the case of motor cars in cases a minimum charge of 2 tons per 8-wheeled wagon is made.

When the condition of the goods or article involve the use of two wagons the minimum weight may be increased accordingly.

Bulky or particularly heavy articles which cannot be loaded without exceeding the maximum running gauge are conveyed only by special arrangement on application to the Superintendent, Railway.

Explosives.—Explosives and other articles of a highly combustible nature are carried at owner's risk rates only and their transport cannot be guaranteed except by special arrangement with the Superintendent, Railway.

Insurance.—When any of the articles enumerated in the schedule to Regulation 76 of the Railway Regulations, 1934, are contained in a parcel or package tendered for despatch and the value thereof exceeds £5, the Railway is not responsible for their loss, destruction or deterioration unless the person sending or tendering them for despatch has caused their value and contents to be declared and paid 2 per cent. on the value so declared as insurance to cover increased risk.

Demurrage.—When any wagons are ordered and not used, or when they are not loaded or unloaded within 24 hours after their arrival, a demurrage charge is made at the rate of 5s. per truck or part thereof per day exclusive of Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday.

Store rent.—Goods to be forwarded which are not loaded, or goods received which are not removed from the Railway goods sheds, yards or other premises within 24 hours from the time of arrival are subject to store rent at the rate of 10 paras per piece per day or part of a day exclusive of Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday.

Goods conveyed or to be conveyed by the Railway may be stored in the Railway goods shed at Famagusta Harbour free of charge for seven days after arrival. Thereafter the following charges are made:—

Rebate.—A rebate of 10% on rail freight is granted for any consignments not already carried at special rates of two tons and over booked through from Famagusta Harbour or Famagusta town for carriage by Rail and Road to any place served by Railway Road Services a distance of 10 miles and over from Nicosia.

NOTE.—Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power undertook to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid was determined to be £57,686 per annum ; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113. 11s. 3d. per annum also became payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 was to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

The above annual payments, which total £92,799. 11s. 3d., are chargeable against the Revenues of the Colony in respect of its share of the Turkish Public Debt charge, but an Imperial Parliamentary Grant of a like amount is made to the Colony annually to cover the total charge.

MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS.

Duties and Powers :—

The regulation of the cleanliness, sanitation and conservancy of the town or village comprised within the municipal limits, and all matters relating to the same ; the control of the erection, alteration and repair of buildings, and the demolition of buildings unfit or dangerous for habitation ; the supervision and control of bakeries, and the inspection of food-stuffs and liquids intended for human consumption ; the regulation of the weighing, measuring and testing of goods ; the grant of profession and trade licences, dog licences, theatre and cinematograph licences, building permits, etc.; the provision of storage accommodation for explosive substances and petroleum ; the establishment of poor-houses ; the provision of slaughter-houses, and the regulation of the slaughter of animals for food ; the construction, improvement, upkeep and lighting of streets ; the regulation of the traffic in the streets ; the provision of a good and sufficient supply of water ; the contribution towards the cost of maintaining public hospitals, and the provision and maintenance of infant welfare centres within municipal limits ; the construction of works of public utility ; the contribution towards or the undertaking of the cost of charitable and educational schemes or institutions ; the acquisition of lands or buildings for any purpose of public utility ; the establishment and regulation of municipal markets and parks or other places of recreation ; and, with the approval of the Governor, the making of bye-laws for the regulation of the various matters coming within the scope of their functions, and the imposition of fees or charges in connection therewith.

Sources of Revenue :—

Rates (at present not levied) on immovable property within municipal limits ; fees for theatre and cinematograph licences, dog licences and building permits ; water rates ; slaughter-house fees ; weighing and measuring fees ; hawking fees ; fees and tolls of municipal markets ; tolls on certain foreign goods ; rents from municipal markets and buildings ; fees for the storage of inflammable substances ; and fines recovered under the Municipal Corporations Laws and bye-laws.

THE CYPRUS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Objects and Duties :—

To watch over and protect the general interests of commerce and industry in Cyprus, and to collect information from foreign manufacturers and traders which may assist the development of commerce and industry ; to establish means whereby the transaction of commercial business may be facilitated ; to encourage and promote new commercial, agricultural and industrial enterprise in Cyprus ; to intervene, as an advisory body, with the local Government in all matters affecting the general interests of Cyprus in commerce and industry ; when requested, to undertake by arbitration and conciliation the settlement of commercial disputes ; to place local merchants in touch with British and foreign manufacturers and merchants and *vice versa* ; to correspond with foreign Chambers of Commerce and similar bodies and private firms for the purpose of obtaining and giving information on the standing and reliability of merchants ; when requested, to deal with all claims, applications, suggestions, petitions, etc., addressed to the Government on subjects of a commercial or industrial nature, whether of general or personal interest ; and to issue certificates of origin for articles produced or manufactured in Cyprus, certificates of membership of the Chamber, certificates of commercial standing, and any other certificates required by traders.

Sources of Revenue :—

Subscriptions of members, annual subsidies granted by Municipal Corporations, and fees for the issue of various certificates and in respect of applications for commercial information.

It is laid down in Clause II of the Instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, dated the 10th March, 1925, that the Executive Council of the Colony shall, save as hereinafter provided, consist of such persons not exceeding four, holding public offices within the Colony as the Governor may, by an Instrument or Instruments made in His Majesty's name and under the Public Seal of the Colony, constitute and appoint to be Members thereof. Whenever any such Member shall die, or resign his seat in the said Council, or be absent from the Colony, or be lawfully suspended from his office, or become from any cause incapable of discharging the duties thereof, the Governor may by any such Instrument as aforesaid nominate any other person whom he shall think fit, being within the Colony, to fill any such vacancy.

In addition to the Members appointed under the above-mentioned clause the Governor may, by an Instrument made in His Majesty's name and under the Public Seal of the Colony, appoint any fit persons residing in the Colony, not exceeding three in number at any one time, to be Members of the said Executive Council, and summon such Additional Members to the meetings of the said Executive Council on any occasion on which he shall think it desirable to obtain their advice.

Provided that meetings of the said Executive Council shall be held to be duly constituted notwithstanding that the said Additional Members may not have been summoned thereto.

An Additional Member of the Executive Council shall vacate his seat as such Additional Member at the end of three years from the date of the Instrument by which he is appointed.

7.—SUMMARY OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

7.—A summarized statement of any developments in the agricultural, forestal, fishing, mining, and other industries of the Colony during the year under review, with a statement as to progress up to date. A special account should be given of Government grants or other action for the development of the natural resources and industries of the Colony.

Cyprus is essentially an agricultural country, and the agricultural population is extremely conservative. Nevertheless owing to the lower prices offered for exportable produce and the loss or partial loss of some nearby markets for certain products on account of tariff or other restrictive measures, the necessity of searching for alternative crops and markets has been brought home to producers and exporters. Furthermore farmers have shown an increased desire to improve their methods.

In recent years the main agricultural developments have been connected rather with marketing than production and to a great extent these conditions applied during 1938. Better marketing and increased production have been rendered possible only by an improvement in the quality of produce offered. Local wheat production was protected by a continuation of protective duties on imported flour.

The grading and packing of citrus fruit for export is now on a better basis and although the whole work is done by hand, the standards of various grades of fruits are much improved. The principal consuming markets again were the United Kingdom and Northern Europe, and owing to increased production, better direct shipping facilities were provided. The produce inspection service is working satisfactorily and by regulations governing the exportation of citrus fruit and other scheduled products, by intensive propaganda, advice and instructions and by rigid inspections carried out at the ports of exportation, the standard of agricultural produce for export has definitely been raised.

The export of wines to the United Kingdom continued on the same scale as in previous years. The quality of wine exported is steadily improving, but the bulk of village made wines is still of poor quality and quite unfit for the better class markets. Co-operative wine-making Societies are, however, increasing in number and output, and the quality of their produce, the making of which is supervised by officers of the Agricultural Department, is much in advance of that of other village wines.

A steady demand exists in neighbouring countries for cattle, mules and donkeys from Cyprus. The services maintained by Government at Stud Stables throughout the Island and the provision of premium donkeys and other stud animals on loan have maintained and improved the quality of the stock and the numbers of animals available for export. Considerable progress is being made in the poultry industry and the demand for hatching eggs and breeding stock of improved breeds from the Government Stock Farm is far in excess of supply.

The flax spinning and weaving establishment formerly at Zodia has been transferred to Nicosia and the flax scutching mill at Yerokipos was operated during the year by private enterprise. Hemp is also exported in small quantities.

The provision of a Tobacco Instructor by Government to assist the growers and instruct them in the proper methods of growing and preparing tobacco was continued. The export of yellow leaf tobacco is now allowed only under a licence to export held by the Cyprus Cigarette Company. There was a good demand for fumigated tobacco.

The silk industry was carried on under the close supervision of Inspectors, who are responsible by law for encouraging and assisting production and giving advice. Prices are at present not such as to encourage increased interest in this industry.

Grants were sanctioned during 1935 by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury from the Colonial Development Fund for (a) Completion of the Agricultural Experiment Stations at Morphou, Saitra and Trikoulia—£5,000; (b) Purchase of Stud Animals for the Government Stock Farm—£2,000 and (c) Construction of Produce Inspection Sheds—£3,150. Part of the grants was spent in 1936, 1937 and 1938, and the balance will be spent in 1939.

Apart from these special forms of assistance to particular industries, the Agricultural Department of the Colony continues to give advice, to encourage the cultivation of all suitable crops, to assist agriculturists, to control animal and plant diseases, and, generally, to foster agriculture, the main industry of the Colony, in all its branches, by means of its various organized technical services and by instruction given by itinerant agricultural officers.

Special attention has been given to the problem of soil erosion and areas have been selected in representative parts of the Island to demonstrate control of soil erosion.

Owing to the increased demand for fruit and forest trees the nursery work of the Department of Agriculture has been extended. Steps have been taken to enlist the collaboration of public bodies and of private individuals to develop and extend the practice of tree planting.

Location and development of subsurface water by drilling were continued during the year. Fifty-five wells were drilled, aggregating 8,305 feet: of these thirty-five were successful producing a volume of 5,259,880 gallons per day.

Owing to lack of funds re-forestation by artificial methods had to be reduced to small scale experiments and to repair-planting in existing plantations. Some 3,721 seedlings were sold to private individuals during the year.

Mining is now an industry of primary importance to the Colony and a large section of the community benefits directly and indirectly as a result of mining operations.

Cupreous pyrites is the principal ore produced. It is shipped to overseas markets where it finds a ready demand at present owing to the disorganization in the Spanish pyrites trade.

There was an appreciable increase in the quantity exported during the year under review and further deposits of this mineral are being opened up.

The output of asbestos showed a decrease compared with the previous year.

Activity in prospecting for precious metals was less than in the previous year.

Among minor industries, carpet-making and broom-making showed continued activity. Most of the Island's requirements of soap are supplied by local soap factories.

Shoe-making and furniture-making are progressing. Owing to change in policy, the Forest Department gave up letting contracts for the manufacture and sale of wooden articles but carpenters are continuing this method of working in wood, following the original work started by the Forest Department.

An elementary system of Timber Grading was started in June, 1937. The Grading Rules were drawn up primarily for Mining timbers but are applicable to all pine timber produced in Cyprus. A grading fee of 5 *paras* per piece is levied on all timber submitted to the two authorized graders appointed by the Forest Department.

The art of embroidery is also well advanced; a great number of girls and women are engaged on needlework and lace-making. Lace is in wide demand abroad.

The making of stockings by machinery mainly for local use has spread considerably and the industry of hat-making, for ladies, is gaining ground.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on public works and valuing their labour at 4½p. per man per diem for stone-breaking and 6p. for other work, and estimating the value of prisoners' labour on constructional work for the Public Works Department at 1s. per diem, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £2,253. 2s. 3p. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, carpentering, stocking-making, farming and baking) is £2,433. 0s. 4½p. There are no Chaplains attached to the prisons. Priests of all denominations are admitted at the request of the prisoners.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held, except at Paphos for Greek-Christians. The Greek-Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. In the Central Prison a service for Moslems is held on Fridays and on Sundays a priest or layman attends and ministers to the members of the Greek Church. The attendance of the hodja and that of the priest and layman has been regular. A religious and general instructor (in addition to the priest or layman) appointed from 6th May, 1906, for Greek ; also for Moslem. Attendance of Moslem and Greek teachers to school classes and for religious instruction has been regular.

Access is allowed to priests of all denominations. They are not apprised when prisoners are admitted, but notice would be given if prisoners expressed a wish to see them.

Answers.

In Central Prison 3 classes of one hour each are held weekly ; in District Prisons there are no schools, but well-conducted prisoners who can read are allowed to have educational and religious books of their respective persuasions.

Prisoners of good behaviour and industrious in labour-sentenced to not less than two years are, if males, after three-fourths, or, if females, after two-thirds of their term of imprisonment has expired, recommended to the Governor for remission of their sentence, with, or without, Ticket of Leave. Prisoners under a sentence of less than two years but not less than one month earn by good conduct and industry a remission of one-sixth of their sentence.

Two prisoners died in prison during the past year as a result of execution. No inquest was held, but the Medical Officer certified in each case that death was due to dislocation of the cervical vertebrae.

- II. There are four full-length enamelled iron baths, two for male wards, one for female wards and one for Maternity wards. There are four water closets, two for male patients and two for female patients. There is also one closet for male patients with one pail.
- III. Night soil pails are cleaned several times daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently whitewashed. In addition there are two bed pan sluices, one in male ward and one in female ward.

Sanatorium.

- I. There is a plentiful supply of good water obtained from wells.
- II. There are no baths, but a wash room is attached to each Block of Buildings in which small zinc baths are used.
- III. Night soil pails are cleaned daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently whitewashed.

Leper Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is plentiful. The water supply is from The Cyprus Irrigation Company which also supplies the Mental Hospital. Quality is good.
- II. There are two zinc baths and two closets, one for male and one for female patients.
- III. Night soil pails cleaned daily, disinfectants used freely, and privies frequently white-washed.

LARNACA:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is practically unlimited. The source is the town aqueduct. Quality is good.
- II. There is a bathroom for each male and female department, with one full-length bath in each.
- III. Drainage of water through cemented conduits into cesspits, pit latrine closets, two for male and two for female patients; the closets are separate from the main building and are reached by a roofed passage.

LIMASSOL:

District Hospital.

- I. The water supply has been further improved by the addition of the Military supply to the Municipal one. Quality now is good, bacteriologically fair and chemically hard.
- II. There are five full-length enamelled baths, one for Sisters, one for private patients, one for Cypriot Nurses, one for male and one for female wards.
Lavatories are of two kinds:—Water-closets and Turkish squat basins.
Water-closets are fitted as follows:—One for Sisters, one for private patients, one for Cypriot Nurses and two for Doctors and Compounders. Turkish squat basins are fitted thus:—Two for male patients, two for female patients and two for out-patients lavatories.
- III. There is a complete flush system throughout the Hospital and Annexes. All waste water is conducted by pipes through traps into a series of septic tanks. This system is working well. The dry-earth system has been completely abolished.

FAMAGUSTA:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is sufficient. Source, a fountain $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant, from which the water is conveyed by an aqueduct. There is also a well in the hospital ground. Quality is good.
- II. There are two water closets and a bathroom for each male and female department with one full-length bath in each.
- III. There is an efficient septic tank connection with the above water closets.

PAPHOS:

District Hospital.

- I. The quantity of water is practically unlimited and is derived from the town supply. Quality is very good.
- II. There are three full-length enamelled iron baths with geysers; one for male and two for female patients. There are four water-closets; two for male and two for female patients.
- III. Drainage of water through iron pipes into cesspits.

KYRENIA:

REMARKS ON THE WEATHER EXPERIENCED DURING THE YEAR 1938.

The Mean Temperature as recorded in the screen at Nicosia during 1938 was 66.2°F. , as against $66^{\circ}.7\text{F.}$ for the last 15 years. The Mean Maximum was 78°F. , and the Mean Minimum $54^{\circ}.4\text{F.}$, as against 78°F. and $54^{\circ}.8\text{F.}$ respectively for the last 15 years.

The average Rainfall for the whole Island for 1938 was 25.40 inches.

The rainy and cool season is from October to March. The climate is varied; hot and dry in the plains in summer, damp on the seashore and cool on the hills.

The Mean Pressure given in the Return is reduced to 32°F. , Mean Gravity and Mean Sea Level.

For a single newspaper published locally and its supplement, irrespective of weight ½p.

REGISTRATION.

Registration fee 2½p.
For an advice of delivery of a Registered article 2½p.

ENQUIRY IN RESPECT OF ANY POSTAL PACKET.

Enquiry fee 2½p.

UNPAID OR INSUFFICIENTLY PREPAID CORRESPONDENCE.

(a) Every ordinary postal packet not prepaid or insufficiently prepaid will be charged on delivery with double postage or double the amount of deficiency; but that charge shall not be less than ½p.

(b) Every registered postal packet not prepaid or insufficiently prepaid will be charged on delivery with an amount equal to the deficient postage.

LATE POSTING.

For every postal packet, irrespective of weight, handed in at any Post Office after the ordinary hours of collection 1p.

DUTY COLLECTION.

For every postal packet delivered in Cyprus upon which Customs duty has to be collected 2p.

POSTE RESTANTE.

(Where there is a House to House Delivery Service.)

For every postal packet addressed "Poste Restante" and delivered in Cyprus ½p.

EXPRESS SEARCH.

(Where there is a House to House Delivery Service.)

(a) For each search made at the request of the addressee for correspondence to be delivered in advance of the ordinary delivery 5½p.
(b) For every ten or less number of items of correspondence beyond the first item 1p.

INSURANCE OF LETTERS AND BOXES.

Letters and boxes for Great Britain and Northern Ireland, certain British Possessions and Foreign Countries can be insured, subject to a limit of insured value and the Postal Insurance Regulations, 1925, at the Post Offices at Famagusta, Kyrenia, Larnaca, Limassol, Nicosia, Paphos, Pedhoulas, Platres and Troödos.

The maximum sum of insurance which may be effected is £120.

The fees payable on letters and boxes for countries to which the system of insurance extends are as follows :—

For letters—

Registration Fee 2½p.

Insurance fee for every £12 or fraction of that amount of the sum assured 2p.

For boxes—

A postage rate of 2p. for every 2 oz. with a minimum charge of 10p.

Registration Fee 2½p.

Insurance fee for every £12 or fraction of that amount of the sum assured 2p.

The registration and insurance fees must be prepaid in addition to the full postage.

Compensation for the loss of an insured letter, or box, or its contents, will not exceed the amount of the actual loss and will in no case exceed the maximum sum of insurance admitted by the country of destination.

RE-DIRECTION.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE

The Postmaster-General shall not be liable to make good any claim arising out of the loss, damage or delay of parcels sent by post.

A system of compensation for loss of or damage to uninsured parcels is in force between Cyprus, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Egypt and France. The maximum amount of compensation payable is £1.

CUSTOMS DECLARATION.

The sender of each parcel for abroad will be required to fill up a Customs Declaration Form. Upon this form must be given an accurate statement of the contents and value, date of posting, and the sender's signature and address.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS.

Parcels on arrival in Cyprus will be liable to examination by an Officer of Customs, who will assess the amount of Customs dues to be charged thereon. The Customs dues will be collected at the time of delivery, and no parcel can be delivered until the Customs and all other charges are paid.

Parcels found to contain forbidden articles and parcels, the contents and value of which have been falsely declared, may be dealt with according to the laws on the subject. And generally the senders of parcels, whether in Foreign Countries or Cyprus, will be required to conform to the Customs and other laws or regulations from time to time in force in respect of such parcels.

Parcels which cannot be delivered, returned to the senders, or re-directed, and which have thus become undeliverable, will eventually be returned to the country of origin.

Parcels becoming offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other parcels will be disposed of as the Postmaster-General may direct.

DUTY COLLECTION FEE.

A fee of 2p. is charged by the Post Office in respect of each parcel delivered in Cyprus upon which Customs duty has to be collected.

UNDELIVERABLE PARCELS.

Parcels to Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Egypt and the Sudan, and those British Possessions and Foreign Countries which have adopted the arrangement, which bear one address only, if not claimed by the addressee within a prescribed period which varies from 15 to 90 days according to the sender or disposed of in accordance with the sender's wishes should such be inscribed on the parcels. If the parcels bear two addresses, they will be held at the disposal of the first addressee for a specified period (usually about half of the total period of retention) and if not claimed will be held at the disposal of the second addressee for the remainder of the total period of retention, and if then unclaimed will be treated as undeliverable

Parcels received from those British Possessions and Foreign Countries which have adopted the above mentioned arrangement will be retained for 15 days, that is to say, 8 days at the disposal of the first addressee and 7 days at the disposal of the second addressee.

Parcels to and from countries which have not agreed to apply the simplified arrangement for the treatment of undeliverable parcels will be retained at the Post Office to which they are addressed for a period not exceeding three months ; but if possible the senders will be consulted, through the office of origin, as to disposal.

FREE DELIVERY.

For the delivery of parcels in Great Britain and Northern Ireland and Egypt free of any charges.

AUTHORITY.

COLLECTION OF TRADE CHARGES.

REMBOURSEMENT SYSTEM.

The "Remboursement" system is designed to meet the requirements of persons who wish to pay for articles sent to them at the time of receipt of the articles and also to meet the requirements of traders and others who wish to recover through the agency of the Post Office the value of articles supplied by them.

Throughout these Regulations the amount to be collected under the "Remboursement" system is called the "Trade Charge."

The amount of Trade Charge shall not exceed the limits accepted by the country of destination and the maximum shall in no case exceed £40 including the fees payable at the office of origin and postage.

Every "Remboursement Parcel" posted or delivered in Cyprus shall be chargeable with such special fees as may be prescribed for that purpose.

The fees payable at the office of origin will be collected at the time of posting; and should be included by the sender in the amount required to be collected from the addressee. The full amount so collected is remitted to the sender of the parcel by means of Trade Charge Money Orders.

Remboursement parcels may be posted at the Post Offices at Famagusta, Kyrenia, Larnaca, Lefka, Lefkara, Lefkoniko, Limassol, Morphou, Nicosia, Paphos, Polis and Yialousa, and at Pedhoulas, Platres and Troödos during the summer season.

The sender of a parcel posted under the Remboursement system may not have the amount of the Trade Charge cancelled or reduced after posting.

If a Remboursement parcel which bears one address only is not claimed by the addressee within a period of 15 days, the parcel will be treated as undeliverable. If a Remboursement parcel bearing two addresses is not claimed by the first addressee within a period of 8 days, the parcel will be held at the disposal of the second addressee for a further period of 7 days and if then unclaimed will be treated as undeliverable.

FEES PAYABLE.

For each Remboursement parcel posted in Cyprus, in addition to the usual postage and insurance or other fees, a fee of 2p.

For each £1 or fraction of £1 on the value of the Trade Charge of each parcel posted in Cyprus, a Remboursement fee of 2p.

For each Remboursement parcel delivered in Cyprus a Delivery fee of 4½p.

INSURANCE OF PARCELS.

Parcels for Great Britain, certain British Possessions and Foreign Countries can be insured, subject to a limit of insured value and the Postal Insurance Regulations, 1925, at the Post Offices at Famagusta, Kyrenia, Larnaca, Limassol, Nicosia, Paphos, Pedhoulas, Platres and Troödos.

The maximum sum of insurance which may be effected is £120.

The fees payable on parcels for countries to which the system of insurance extends are:—

The insurance fee must be prepaid in addition to the full postage.

The amount of compensation payable for the loss or damage of an insured parcel, or its contents, will not exceed the amount of the actual loss or damage and will in no case exceed the maximum sum of insurance admitted by the country of destination.

A parcel containing jewellery if addressed to a British Possession or Foreign Country must be insured for as much of the journey as the regulations permit, and for at least part of its value.

Parcels containing coin cannot be accepted for transmission by parcel post even if insured.

Money Orders for countries served through the Post Office of Great Britain will be converted at a rate approximating to the market rate of exchange, and will be subject to the ordinary reduction of commission payable on "through" Orders.

Telegraphic Money Order Service is established between Cyprus and England.

The remitter of a Telegraph Money Order is required to pay, in addition to the ordinary Money Order Commission, the cost of the Telegram of Advice at the deferred (or ordinary) rate per word from Cyprus to England and also a Supplementary Fee of 4½p.
